## **Understanding Definitions**

(Continued from Page 1) One does not have to do the floor work, but the group should be using the wording in the blue manual.

I decided to look up the definitions and thought I would share them with you.

A non-profit organization is a group organized for purposes other than generating profit and in which no part of the organization's income is distributed to its members, directors, or officers. A nonprofit organization (NPO) is one that is not driven by profit but by dedication to a given cause that is the target of all income beyond what it takes to run the organization. Because of this, NPOs receive tax-exempt status from the federal government, meaning they

do not have to pay income tax. What is a charitable donation?

A charitable donation is a gift of money or goods to a tax-exempt organization that can reduce your taxable income.

To claim a deduction for charitable donations on your taxes, you must have donated to an IRS-recognized charity and received nothing in return for your gift. Donated to a friend's GoFundMe? That is typically not tax-deductible.

- · An organization can be nonprofit without 501(c)(3) status, which can make it tricky to ensure your charity of choice counts.
- Not all donations made to a Grange are tax deductible. One should check with their accoun-

tant or tax advisor before claiming a tax deduction for a donation made to the Grange.

Donation made to PICK (People Improving Communities and Kids) is tax deductible. PICK can accept donations for a Grange and the Grange can apply for those funds for a specific project.

#### Who qualifies for sales tax exemption in Colorado?

- · Charities & Nonprofits. Generally, an organization qualifies for sales tax-exempt status if it is organized and operated exclusively for one of the following purposes: It is a religious, charitable, scientific, testing for public safety, literary, or educational organization.
- The individual organization has to apply for a sales tax-exempt license from the Secretary of State in order to not pay sales tax on items purchased. They require filing quarterly.



1 C. creamy peanut butter 2/3 C. brown sugar OR coconut sugar 1 ½ t. vanilla

OATMEAL COOKIES

2 large eggs

2/3 C. rolled oats

1 t. baking soda

2/3 C. chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a small bowl, add oats and baking soda.

In a medium bowl whisk peanut butter, brown sugar, eggs, and vanilla for about 5 minutes.

Add dry ingredients into liquid ingredients and mix well.

Add chocolate chips, reserving a few to put on top.

Grease a baking sheet and scoop out 1 T batter, 2"apart and top off with a few chocolate chips.

Flatten top of cookie with two fingers.

Bake 9-11 minutes and let cool completely before removing or they will break apart.

They may look underdone but will continue to cook once removed from the oven.

Yield: 16-20 cookies. Enjoy!

Surgery can be scary. That's why some patients and families used their experience to make this. It has questions they think are important. You can circle the ones you want to ask and write your own questions, It's OK if you don't want to ask some of these questions. You can ask your surgeon about whatever is important to you. You can tell your surgeon how much or how little you want them to know. And you can ask your surgeon to explain anything you don't understand. You have options for treatment. We hope this helps you and your surgeon decide what's right for you.

What is likely to happen if I do

have surgery? If I don't have sur-

In your opinion, will surgery make me feel better?

In your opinion, will surgery help me live longer? If so, how much lon-

What will I be able to do that I cannot do now?

Will I have any tubes or drains put in during or after surgery? Will I need them at home?

be able to go home? In your opinion, how will this surgery affect my other health issues (Such a as diabetes or high blood pressure?)

After I leave the hospital, what type of help do you think I will need? (Medical equipment, caregiv-

#### What happens if things go wrong after surgery?

Can you describe serious complications and explain what those might mean for me?

If I'm too sick to speak for myself how can I make sure you know my wishes?

## **Agriculture** Report

Several recent events about bird flu and humans have been active in our news — my interpretation is the apprehensions about human infection and possible human-to-human infections is a fear that far exceeds reality. Human infection is very rare and so far, the virus appears stable and free of mutations that would place us at risk.

Below is paraphrased from National Grange, Mar. 28, View from the Hill, Bird Flu Found in Dairy Cows:

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (bird flu) [H5N1 virus] has been detected in dairy cows in Kansas, New Mexico, and Texas; virus appears to have been introduced by wild birds. Dairy farmers became concerned when milk production dropped sharply, the cows lethargic. However, the cows appeared to recover in a week or so on their own and the affected cows did not appear to be transmitting the virus to other cows within the same herd. Initial testing by the National Veterinary Services Laboratories has not found changes to the virus that would make it more transmissible to humans which would indicate the current risk to humans is low. Pasteurization of milk also kills viruses and bacteria, and the process is required for milk sold through interstate commerce. In addition, the bird flu virus cannot be transmitted to humans by eating properly cooked meat and poultry products.

A USA Today article reports humans have contracted bird flu, in one instance, apparently from contact with infected dairy cows. A member of the Colorado Senate Ag Committee related one of his constituents had been infected, and recovered. The challenge remains safe unless this virus mutates and becomes transmitted from cow-to-human or from birds-to-humans.

The risk has been limited to trans-

mittal from birds-to-birds (chickens, turkeys, etc.) and the apparent rare infection of farm animals, largely dairy cows, with no mutations placing humans at risk, and this status has not changed in 20 years.

Where humans are infected, Tamiflu is the suggested treatment. Dairy cows experience pinkeye and mild upper respiratory symptoms, milk production is off (milk is not used for human consumption) then they recover. Milk pasteurization will inactivate the virus.

Eggs from infected chickens do not enter trade and infected chickens are killed to prevent further spread of the virus to non-infected flocks. Our wild mammals, including mink, seals, foxes, skunks, and domestic dogs and cats are vulnerable to bird flu but apparently do not experience severe effects.

My guess is our flocks of chickens for eggs and meat production remain at risk from infected wild birds, could be flocks of geese passing over, and when infected, the poultry producers are burdened with destroying products and killing off their birds.



With 2 red and 2 blue 4  $1\!\!\!/2$  " squares, sew a 2  $1\!\!\!/2$  " white square to one corner. Cut 1/4" off the sew line and press towards the white. Sew the 4 remaining 2 ½" squares to the other side of the color, cut ¼" off sew line and press towards the white. These 4 units will make your star points.

## **Legislative Activity**

Colorado's state legislature is close to 50 days into its 120-day lawmaking period while legislators have introduced over 486 bills addressing myriad issues, this session has perceptibly been colored by the residual effects of both the 2023 session as well as the special session related to residential property tax relief that occurred last November. While issues surrounding housing, public safety, health care, and general affordability remain at the fore, the first six weeks of the Colorado General Assembly's work has thus far been largely dominated by occurrences linking back to previous sessions, including a series of resignations and protests, as well as,leadership and committee changes.

For example, Democratic Reps. Ruby Dickson and Said Sharbini left their positions between the 2023 special session and the outset of the 2024 session, necessitating a series of vacancy appointments to fill their posts. In that same vein, former House Assistant Minority Leader Rose Pugliese (R) ascended to the minority leader post in the opening weeks of the session after caucus members forced votes to oust Rep. Mike Lynch from the top Republican job in that chamber.

However, while the 2024 session is shaping up to be one of the most unpredictable in recent memory (particularly with November's elections on the minds of lawmakers, certain key issues and themes have emerged that will certainly shape the rest of the Colorado General Assembly's work moving forward. Meanwhile, Gov. Jared Polis (D) has stated his intent to resurrect priority proposals for his administration that failed last session.

Chief among those is a package of bills that would dramatically alter the current relationship between the state and local governments related to the creation of housing supply, particularly affordable housing. Specifically, instead of an omnibus bill like last session's SB23-213, Capitol observers are expecting a number of standalone proposals that would require local governments to reconfigure their planning as it relates to accessory dwelling units (ADUs), housing located near public transit corridors, occupancy limits, among other potential proposals.

Democratic lawmakers have also promised a continued focus on longer-term solutions on property taxes, eliminating Colorado's public school budget stabilization factor and ensuring the state's climate goals address environmental justice.

Republicans' priorities weren't too different: insulate Colorado's increasing cost of living, provide relief for small businesses, and promote public safety. And while stated goals were similar across party lines, many of the bills introduced make it clear that Democrats and Republicans have differing perspectives on how to achieve them.

Lawmakers seem to clash on housing and environmental solutions, and appear more aligned on addressing data privacy, the burgeoning artificial intelligence (AI) industry, and our state's mental health crisis.


a short introduction to bee behavior. Next month she will give a longer talk. Two lucky people took home a dozen eggs each from Lindsey and John Rominsky.

Clouds: what type of clouds? Cirrus, etc. (check the sites of our Weather Partners for more information!)

Precipitation: rain, show, hail (Check out https://www.cocorahs.org/ for a great precipitation collection activity)

Phenology Notes: arrival of birds such as robins and finches, budding out of trees, blooms on trees or plants on the ground, ice is out on the lake, moon phase, other events that occur for the first time each season. Include if there is extreme weather such as thunderstorms, blizzards, heat waves, etc.
